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ABSTRACT

RATIONALE

- On the contrary, students who are not encouraged often drop out
- We asked students to look into their culture and then to write a legend
- The students were ecstatic to have an assignment focus on their lives and beliefs
- When students are excited, they work harder

Learning Goals

- I wanted for students to coexist together in a safe learning environment
- Students were to learn about themselves and their peers
- While this was happening, students were meeting Common Core State Standards in English and Language Arts
- I learned that all of this was possible, necessary and fun!



Process

- Every Tuesday, my mentor and I would go to Chiloquin Elementary
- We taught first grade in the morning and sixth in the afternoon
- As a team, we enforced a safe learning environment
- If the idea was too foreign to a student, we would sit with them at lunch and give them the extra attention they required to understand what safe meant
- When students receive respect, they give respect


THE DARKER IT GETS, THE BRIGHTER I BECOME
